## **Proposed PPERRIA Policy on Policies**

A Motion to adopt the following Policy will be made by Steve Cross, forwarded from the Executive Committee without recommendation:

It is PPERRIA policy that a proposed response to a public agency, about a public issue that is or may be considered by that public agency, must be based on a specific written proposal in the records of that public agency. That is, neither the PPERRIA Board of Directors, nor the Executive Committee, nor any committee may act on a response to any public agency that are based on rumors of what may be proposed to or considered by that public agency.

A Motion to reallocate \$15,000 of NRP Phase I Funds were unclaimed by Hennepin County for purposes of funding the Block Nurse Program to Administrative Purposes will be voted upon at the March PPERRIA Board/Membership meeting.

#### Minutes of January 24, 2005 Meeting

1) The 01/24/2005 Prospect Park East River Road Improvement Association Inc. (PPERRIA) Board of Directors (BOD)/Membership/Neighborhood (B/M/N) meeting was called to order by Joe Ring, President, at 7 P.M. the Prospect Park United Methodist Church (PPUMC) Malcolm/Orin Avenues S.E., Minneapolis, Minnesota 55414.) Introduced were guests and first time attendees. Motion made by Tony Garmers, seconded by Florence Littman and passed without noes: "To accept the amended agenda for this meeting that was available at this meeting." Item 3/DeLaSalle's plan to buy Minneapolis Park Board land, was added to Item 9/Zoning Report. A quorum of the Board Of Directors (BOD) was present. Second Ward Councilmember and PPERRIA member Paul Zerby

- abstained on all motions. See attached Item 1. This meeting is governed by Robert's Rules of Order. Items attached to these minutes were available at this meeting. There were no additional items added to this agenda.
- Motion made by Phil Anderson, seconded by Dave Kaar and passed without noes: "That the minutes of the 11/22/04 PPERRIA B/M/N meeting as published in the 01/05 PPERRIA Newsletter be accepted." See attached Item 2.
- 3) Moved to Item 9.
- 4) Emily Watts, Minneapolis Public Library Program Coordinator; and Jerry Blue, Minneapolis Public Library Patron Service North Area Manager, reviewed the 12/20/04 ending of bookmobile service in Minneapolis. The current bookmobile, age ten years, has been declared a health and safety hazard. The Library Board is using this as an opportunity to develop a comprehensive plan for Outreach Services for 2005. Repair or replacement of the bookmobile could cost up to \$150,000.00. There should be by 04/05 a resolution of the issue of non library building service in the neighborhoods. Provided was a listing of alternative services. See attached Item 4.
- 5) Kelly Moriarity, Minneapolis Public Works, provide updates concerning the issue of the 65 year old bridge on East River Parkway over the Bridal Veil Falls. This is just west of the intersection of Franklin, East River Parkway and 27th Avenues S.E. The bridge needs to be replaced and the city is using this as an opportunity to see if there can be a more public viewing of the falls. Greg Brown, consultant for the area study, reviewed the identified options that are the result of earlier neighborhood meetings. They include: A) Replacing the bridge as it now is with a possible overhang so that the falls could be seen from the parkway; B) Narrowing the bridge for east only traffic with west traffic using streets north of parkway (several versions); C) Construction a pedestrian only parkway bridge and the vehicle traffic routed to north of parkway streets: D) Constructing a "roundabout" at the intersection (several versions). There are three users, vehicles, bikes/pedestrians, and river trail that need to be considered as well as the through-the-intersection traffic, the residents/businesses of the intersection and the neighborhood. Of specific concern if pedestrian/bicycle through-the-intersection and the through traffic impact on the neighborhood. Any proposed bridge work would retain the existing style. See the 01/21-02/17 The Southeast Angle article. There were questions about the continued operation of the falls. Watch for announcements of a 02/05 public meeting. The poor condition of the existing bridge will necessitate something being done soon. For more information see www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/public-works/cip/bridal-veil/ or 612-673-3617 Kelly Moriarity.
- Motion made by Bill Kahn, seconded by Don Piccard and passed without noes: "That PPERRIA supports a "Good Neighbor Agreement" with the Rock-Tenn Corporation at their paper recycling facilities east of the neighborhood in St. Paul. Kahn, the Environmental Committee Chair, indicated that these agreements are being negotiated and some signed with facilities that emit pollution that affect the neighborhood. The S.E Como Improvement Association has endorsed the issue. These agreements have no legal standing but are useful in addressing issues regarding the facilities and are especially helpful in facilitating communication. Of procedural concern of this motion is that: A) There was not agreement within the committee regarding the utility of Good Neighbor Agreements, Bill hopes that there will be a reorganization of the committee as a more productive entity. He has resigned from the committee due to burnout; B) Bill has already signed and sent the letter as the deadline date has passed. PPERRIA's procedures are that issues are brought before the appropriate committee. The committee does the heavy lifting and sends a recommendation to the Executive Committee which reviews and looks for loopholes and surprises and then makes a recommendation to the BOD. At the B/M/N meeting, the issue is reviewed and discussed and a official position taken. Although PPERRIA BOD does not see a reason to not support this issue, it does raise questions to the process followed, but recognizes that the deed is done.
- 7) Motion by Tom Kilton, seconded by Mary Alice Kopf and passed with no noes: "To re-allocate \$2,553.43 Prospect Park NRP Phase I funds to Prospect Park NRP Phase I Administration. These funds to be re-allocated remain for the completed projects: A) \$1,273.15—Luxton Park Kiosk; B)

- \$765.52—Neighborhood Signs; C) \$500.00—Luxton Park Computer Classrooms—closed; D) 414.76—Neighborhood Learning Center, Environmental landscaping, block Club Cleanup, Graffiti Removal Supplies, Prospect Park Directory and Childcare Startup." See attached Item 7. This will "zero" out those project accounts. See previous B/M/N for additional information and comments.
- Announcements: A) All were reminded of the 01/31/05 meeting, 7 pm at St. Frances Cabrini (1500 Franklin Avenue S.E.) to develop objectives for the planning of the transit corridor on University Avenue S.E. and at 29th Avenue S.E., a proposed stop in Prospect Park. See attached Item 8-A; B) Steve Cross and Dick Poppele, Prospect Park NRP Phase II Steering Committee chairs, that the Steering Committee has developed a neighborhood public meeting schedule to construct an "Action Plan": 04/05 a rank order of proposals meeting: 05/05 acceptance of proposals meeting: 06/05 meeting at which be accepted a full Action Plan that will be presented to NRP and for acceptance by the city; Fall 05 the start of the implementation of the Action Plan. The housing mandates of NRP II seem to be clearer with definitions, etc; C) It seems that at the Steering Committee meetings, residents of the Glendale Community voiced service and maintenance concerns that could be addressed ASAP by the city rather than by NRP. Steve and Dick are helping the residents address and get resolution of the concerns: D) Steve Cross announced that there would be a Second Ward and Mayor Candidates night sponsored by PPERRIA on 02/22/05, 7 pm at Cabrini; E) Joe Ring announced that on 03/12/05, the #8 MTC bus will return to its original route on Franklin Avenue S.E. through the neighborhood. The efforts of all, especially Dorothy Marden, were successful; F) The president of the St. Anthony Park-St. Paul Council informed Joe Ring that the Hubbard property north of the KSTP complex was up for sale. This is the Fourth Street S.E. area that was cleared of pollution and on which KSTP was planning a campus for their now sold satellite business; G) The issue of Wellington Development Corporation using on their proposed "Metro Lofts. At Prospect Park" ads is moving along. Legal opinion is that there is a state statute that does not allow one municipality to make claims about another. Metro Lofts is in St. Paul on University Avenue east of the Wells Fargo Bank. Contacts with the Hennepin County Attorney office are in progress; H) Joe Ring referred all to the inclusion of Prospect Park in the 2005 Best of Minnesota Issue of "Minnesota Monthly."
- 9) Florence Littman, Zoning Committee Chair reviewed the items before the committee. Note: Abstained on motions regarding the Minneapolis Park Board was Rachel Ramadhyani as she works for the Park Board: A) Motion made by Peter LaSha, seconded by Dick Kain and passed with some noes: "That PPERRIA opposes the sale or lease of Minneapolis Park Land on Nicollet Island to De LaSalle High School." Comments were: The existing public park facilities on the site would be lost; There would be a change in the Nicollet Island character by closing a street, an increase in nonlocal traffic and changing open land to developed land; There is not a full plan in place; more information is needed before a position can be taken by PPERRIA; There continues the sale/use of park land to private parties; B) Motion made, seconded and passed without noes: "That until there is adequate documentation, that PPERRIA "tables" the issue of the University of Minnesota (UM) earlier proposed University of Minnesota boat house proposed to be located on the earlier UM showboat site at Minneapolis River Flats Park." This motion overrode an earlier motion for support with conditions, the feeling that undefined conditions enforcement is questionable. The PPERRIA Zoning Committee position that if there are no public access and programs to the project there is no PPERRIA support is a start. This is another example of the issue of public-to-private public land use. The UM has presented changes to the project that meet most of the design issues, but the public use issues identified at an earlier PPERRIA meeting are not addressed; C) Motion made by Florence Littman, seconded by Phil Anderson and passed without noes: "That PPERRIA supports the West Bank Community Coalition in their opposition to the sale of Minneapolis park land for the development of a private 200 unit apartment complex." PPERRIA tends to support other neighborhoods when the positions are consistent with positions PPERRIA has taken: D) The Kemp's facility at 29<sup>th</sup> and University Avenue S.E. is for sale. Kemps has moved to other locations. Included is 18,000 square feet of office space, 32,000 square feet of warehouse space, 10,000 square feet of garage space, 15,000 square feet of freezer space and 5,000 square feet of shop. The committee is working on saving the "Samantha, the Kemp's Cow" sign A local business owner has proposed that he purchase the site, tentatively named "Prospect Park Properties"; E) The U Garden restaurant on University Avenue and 29th Avenues S.E. has request a zoning change from OR2

(Office/Residental) to C3 (Community Activities) A nonconforming use permit would not allow them to add to their present building a private dining area. The site is large enough for the addition. The committee does not oppose the change; F) There is a new owner of the Stadium Village Mall at Ontario and Washington Avenues S.E. The new owner has indicated that the current zoning of C1 does not allow some possible uses. The building is 80% vacant and as the remaining leases expire they will not be renewed. There is no formal change request; G) Stub and Herbs in Stadium Village has requested an upgrade of their liquor license to include no-more than three live entertainers. The committee does not oppose the request; H) The apartment complex, at Huron Boulevard and Fulton Avenues S.E. in the Motley Neighborhood, built in 1972 now turns out to have one more unit than the zoning allows. This was not an issue until now. The committee does not oppose a special condition use for this complex that would address an issue that the city has long overlooked; I) The long ago proposed project by the Wall Developers of research facilities for the UM in the area north of University Avenue S.E. along the UM Transit Way has been reopened. Wall will be presenting to the Zoning Committee their proposal; J) There are unclear proposals to the Minneapolis Land Use Plan that are not yet public.

- 10) Joyce Barta, Prospect Park-NRP Coordinator, referred all to the Prospect Park-NRP Contractor Activities Report as published in the 01/05 PPERRIA Newsletter. See attached Item 10.
- 11)/12) New/Old Business: A) Don Piccard indicated that the Minnichs who purchased and then donated the small triangle of land between the intersection of East River Parkway, Franklin and 27<sup>th</sup> Avenues S.E. and the house on Thornton Avenue S.E., have asked about the sign indicating the Minnich Park that was to be installed by the Minneapolis Park Board. All are unsure when this issue was addressed initially by PPERRIA, probably at least 15 years ago. The River Gorge Committee and the Secretary will research and report: B) The issue of the proposed PPERRIA By-Law change regarding membership was mentioned by two members.
- 13) Motion made, seconded and passed without noes:" That this meeting be adjourned." There was no additional business conducted at this meeting.
