3. Items for Consideration:

Minutes from September 22nd PPERRIA meeting – (Dan Patenaude)

1) The 9/22/03 Prospect Park East River Road Improvement Association Inc. (PPERRIA) Board of Directors (BOD)/Membership/Neighborhood (B/M/N) meeting was called to order by Steve Banks, President, at 7 P.M. at the Prospect Park United Methodist Church (PPUMC) (Orlin/Malcolm Avenues S.E. Minneapolis, Minnesota 55414). A quorum of the BOD was present. Introduced were first time attendees, quests and visitors. Motion made, seconded and passed without noes: "To accept as the agenda for this meeting the agenda that was available at this meeting." See attached Item 1. There were no additional agenda items considered at this meeting.

2) Motion made by Steve Cross, seconded by Florence Littman and passed without noes: "The minutes of the 7/28/03 PPERRIA B/M/N as published in the 9/03 PPERRIA Newsletter and available at this meeting be accepted. See attached Item 2.

3) Allison Rajala, Como Neighborhood Improvement Association, reviewed the Tuttle/Pratt Middle School "Middle School Stuff" fund raiser to be matched by Hawkins Inc., a chemistry-based products company located in the Como neighborhood. Now that there is a community middle school [!!!] there is a need for "stuff" for the science labs, phy-ed and arts programs. The goal is a total of \$30,000. 4) Kari Simonson, PPERRIA/NRP Block Club Coordinator, reviewed the recent Neighborhood Night Out on 8/5/03. There were 10 separate block parties throughout the neighborhood with many of them combining two or more blocks to make organization easier and turn-out higher. A number of parties had visits from the Minneapolis Police Department and S.A.F.E. Over 400 neighbors attended a block party that evening with the weather cooperating. Block leaders reported that nametags provided by the City of Minneapolis were helpful for meeting new neighbors. The city also provided door hangers that helped announce the parties. Numerous Minnesota Twins ticket vouchers donated by the Twins were a fun give-away item. The National Night Out Block Parties are held each year on the first Tuesday night of August. If your block did not have a party this year, consider volunteering to help organize one for next year. Contact Kari Simonson at 612-331-2776 or 612-331-2772. See attached Item 4.

5) Tom Kilton, Neighborhood Clean Up Coordinator, reviewed the recent Neighborhood Clean Up. This event has been held for many years and yet each cleanup yields about the same number of trucks full of stuff. Changes in the program by the city resulted in the pickup of metal (two large trucks), tires (several pickups), concrete (almost a full large bin) and a combined brush/Buckthorn cuttings (two very full donated packer trucks). Hennepin County provided a site in the neighborhood to which individual neighbors could bring their hazardous waste. Items that can be picked up in the weekly trash and biweekly recycle were not picked up this year. There were fifty "truckee" neighborhood volunteers, a good turn out. [Thank you!] The morning-only schedule tended to work and the additional cost of the neighborhood having to pay for the metal trucks was covered by donations, along with the breakfast and lunch. Watch for a published report. The committee continues to review the procedures and printed materials so that each year there is improvement.

Sept. 22 Minutes (cont.)

6) Motion made by Betts Zerby, seconded by Susan Larson-Fleming and passed without noes: "That PPERRIA make up to \$1,000 available to the PPERRIA History Committee for the production of a Prospect Park calendar. The money would be paid back to PPERRIA by the proceeds from the sale of the calendar." The recent publishing of the Prospect Park Neighborhood History book resulted in a large supply of photographs and drawings.

7) Julia Mackenzie-Cross introduced herself as the new JOY (Just Older Youth) Coordinator and reviewed that program. There are active and non-active activities/ programs for age 55+ residents of the neighborhood. JOY is a program of the Minneapolis Parks and Recreation Department. 8) Todd Renbold, VP of Public Affairs for the University of Minnesota Graduate Professional Student Association, introduced himself and his organization. This contact is part of the concern that there needs to be more and ongoing involvement of the different stakeholders of the University of Minnesota (UM) and the non UM stakeholders that the actions of the UM affect and visa-versa. This can be addressed by interaction of the UM Organizations/PPERRIA and by those UM students who live in the Prospect Park neighborhood to join PPERRIA and run for membership on the PPERRIA Board of Directors.

9) Announcements: Phil Anderson, Zoning Committee member, reviewed his research on two issues brought forward by the neighborhood regarding the going-ons at the East River Mews Town Home/Condominium project at Franklin and Thornton Avenues (27th East River Parkway): A) Why such slow construction? Brighton Development/Builder/ Owner financing requires that at least half of the units in a building need to be sold before financing is provided for construction. Two of the townhome buildings are under construction with the foundation of a third building being put in place. So far only one of the twelve condominiums is sold. Condominiums tend to sell later as there is a different market and buyers tend to like to see built parts of a condominium project; B) Why are there holes on the site that fill with water? These 30'x6'x10' holes are catchment basins designed to hold up to one foot of onsite drainage that will later drain into the city storm sewer system after any neighborhood drainage has been taken care of.

10) Florence Littman, Zoning Committee Chair, reported that there will be additional building inspections in the Marcy/Holmes and Como neighborhoods. At present there is none scheduled for the Prospect Park Neighborhood. She reviewed the issues brought before the committee. A) A zero set back variance to replace an existing garage at 111 Arthur Avenue S.E. was recommended with amendments that the runoff water generated be restricted to the site, the garage be no higher than the existing garage, the walls be of an open lattice construction and that any encroachments on a neighbor's property be corrected. This is a project that has been in the works for several years and a year ago there was a site plan okayed by the city that is different than the current one. The city was not going to request a review of the current plan. B) The at least four year saga of the landscaping plan for the Great Brakes site on University Avenue S.E. and between Bedford and Clarence Avenues S.E. continues. The property owner has done some of the work correctly, but there remains other undone work. Next chapter? C) The issue of an appropriate and acceptable fence between the neighbors on Fourth Street S.E. and the Alliance clinic and Fraser School properties on University Avenue S.E. continues. There remain unresolved issues and requirements between the two businesses that probably will delay the finishing of the fence until 2004.

Sept. 22 minutes (cont.)

11) Joyce Barta, PPERRIA/NRP Coordinator, reviewed the PPERRIA/NRP 7/11/03 to 8/8/03 Contractor billings and activities as published in the 9/03 PPERRIA Newsletter and available at this meeting. Billed was \$628.00 for committee support. Total billings 10/18/95 to 8/8/03=\$148,208.34. Remaining amount for future billings up to \$6,258.69. See attached Item 11.

12/13) Old/New Business: A) Dick Kain (1 Orlin) indicated that there is an increasing problem in that area with non-resident on-street parking, vehicles not being able to drive through the street and needing to back up, running of stop signs at the Orlin/Malcolm corner and speeding. An extensive listing of similar situations and alternatives was had. The issue was referred to the Transportation and Land Use Committee, John DeWitt, Chair. B) Julie MacKenzie-Cross commented on the increased airplane traffic over the neighborhood. Additional information about this concern is needed before there can be any neighborhood action. As there is not a "livability" committee to address issues of this type, someone is going to have to take charge.

14) Motion made, seconded and passed without noes: "That this meeting be adjourned." There was no additional business conducted at this meeting.
